## LMSA Art Infusion Lesson Plan

Lesson: This week's lesson investigate division by creating flowers and then dividing them amongst recipients

- TTW assign each student a word
  - o Ex: CAT
- TSW break apart their word into individual letters/sounds
  - Ex: CAT=C A T
- TTW demonstrate how to divide the paper into three spaces
- TIW demonstrate how to use the provided chart to determine which line will represent each letter
- TSW determine which line will represent each letter in their word by using the chart
  - Ex: C will be a wavy line; A will be a straight line; T will be a zigzag line
- TSW fill each section in with the appropriate lines according to the order of their word using a pencil

- Ex: In the top section, I will represent the letter C with repeated Wavy Lines filling the whole section
- In the middle section, I will represent the letter Awith repeated Straight lines filling the whole section
- o In the bottom section, I will represent the letter Twith repeated zig zag lines filling the whole section
- TSW trace over their pencil lines with an oil pastel using the same color in the top and bottom sections to distinguish the consonants from the middle vowel.
- TSW trace over their pencil lines in the middle section using a DIFFERENT color oil pastel to distinguish the vowel from the two consonants
- TSW watercolor over their oil pastel with a similar or complementary color in the top and bottom sections.
- TSW watercolor over their oil pastel with a similar or complementary color to the oil pastel in the middle section.
- TSW use another ½ sheet piece of paper and a pencil to draw the image of their word
  - Ex: I will draw a cat
- TSW use oil pastels to trace the lines they drew
- TSW watercolor the image they just drew
- TSW cut the image out
- TSW glue the image to the middle of their line paper
