
WHO WE ARE

The Mississippi Arts Commission is a state agency serving nearly three million people through grants and special initiatives that enhance communities, assist artists and arts organizations, promote and facilitate arts education, and celebrate Mississippi's cultural heritage. MAC receives funding through the National Endowment for the Arts, the Mississippi Legislature, and private sources.



BUILDING FUND FOR THE ARTS (BFA) (GOAL 1)

\$3 Million Awarded 16 arts organizations across 13 counties (15 House Districts; 13 Senate Districts)

Out of the 66 organizations that submitted proposals, 16 arts facilities were awarded funds to support the repair and renovation of their buildings for the public to make full use of these spaces. Continued support for BFA strengthens endeavors to maintain creative spaces throughout the state. The facility upgrades the arts organizations described could increase revenue, production quality, educational offerings, and would represent a long-term cost savings.

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MISSISSIPPI WHOLE SCHOOLS

(GOALS 1 AND 3)

\$103,095

Total direct funds to schools Does not include workshops, advisors, institutes, trainings, etc.

Mississippi Whole Schools works with K-12 schools throughout the state to provide training and support for integrating the arts across their curriculum.

Additional funding support made it possible to train **7** additional consultants to support school growth. These consultants provided data aligned training that included on-site training for teachers and leadership training for administrators.

On average, Mississippi Whole School Model Schools score **20** percentile points higher than their peers on the MS Statewide Assessments. In addition, these schools outperformed their peers in the same district by **27** percentile points in ELA and **21** percentile points in Math.

Since 2021, Mississippi Whole School Model schools have scored an average of **23** percentile points higher in ELA and **17** percentile points higher in Math than their peers in the same district.

MEET THE MAC (GOAL 1)

MAC hosted **18** Meet the MAC presentations across the state in FY23. These presentations gave attendees the opportunity to ask questions and find out more about the grants offered by MAC and the process to apply. MAC saw **53** applications from first-time applicants from **14** counties from 14 counties where presentations were held, including one "underserved" county. **35** (**66%**) of those new applicants (**8** organizations and **27** individuals) were recommended to receive funding in FY24.

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MISSISSIPPI ARTS HOUR (GOAL 1)

The Mississippi Arts Hour airs every Sunday at 5 p.m. CT on Mississippi Public Broadcasting Think Radio. An average of **3,500** listeners tune in weekly to hear stories about Mississippi artists making an impact locally, nationally, and internationally. The show is also distributed as a podcast and has an average of 900 downloads per month.

Mississippi Folklife (www.mississippifolklife.org)



Mississippi Folklife is a digital journal featuring original writing and documentary work focused on present-day folklife and traditional arts within the state. Originally a print publication, Mississippi Folklife was established in 1927 by the Mississippi Folklore Society. In FY23, Mississippi Folklife published **7** essays. The essays included online exhibits highlighting Mississippi artists.



Folk Arts Apprenticeship Showcase

On April 1, 2023, MAC hosted the Folk Arts Apprenticeship Showcase at the Craftsmen's Guild of MS in Ridgeland. The showcase celebrated the FY23 apprenticeship

grantees as they completed their apprenticeship coursework together. During the event, the two apprenticeship teams Brian Beckham and Martha Scarborough (Apprenticeship in Silversmithing) and Katie Clark and Sarah Rose Govero (Apprenticeship in Crochet) demonstrated their work to visitors. The showcase was a part of the Spring Demo Day programming at the Craftsmen's Guild. There were 40 people in attendance at the showcase.

I Ain't Lying Digitization Project and **Exhibit on Mississippi Folklife**

I Ain't Lying was a cultural journalism magazine that explored local life and traditional arts in Claiborne County, MS. It was published in four print issues between 1980 and 1989 by Mississippi Cultural Crossroads (MCC) in Port Gibson. During FY23, MAC partnered with MCC founder Patty Crosby and MDAH to digitize the print issues of I Ain't Lying. This project and subsequent exhibit on the Mississippi Folklife website marked the first time that the magazine was available digitally as well as the first time that content from the unpublished Volume 5 was made available to the public.



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MISSISSIPPI WRITERS TRAIL (GOAL 2)

The Mississippi Writers Trail is a series of historical markers which celebrate the literary, social, historical, and cultural contributions of Mississippi's most acclaimed and influential writers. An advisory committee of state cultural agencies oversees the process of installing historical markers in places of significance to an author's life. To emphasize the literary focus of the trail, the markers are cast in the shape of an open book and display information about the author's life with the goal of educating the public about the legacy of Mississippi writers. This year we installed three new markers for:

MENTAL HEALTH AND THE CREATIVE MIND (GOAL 2)

MAC's Mental Health and the Creative Mind initiative partners with artists and mental health professionals to create a safe space for vital conversations. We also aim to support and shine a light on artists and arts organizations tackling mental health issues through their work. For example, earlier this year, MAC partnered with New Stage Theatre for a postshow discussion following a matinee of EVERY BRILLIANT THING. This show took a deep dive into exploring mental health through one character's personal journal.

In the coming year, we hope to continue the conversation and provide Mississippi artists with mental health resources.

GOVERNOR'S ARTS AWARDS (GOALS 2 AND 4)

POETRY OUT LOUD (GOAL 4)

Poetry Out Loud is a national arts education program that encourages the study of great poetry by offering free educational materials and a dynamic recitation competition for high school students across the country.

This year **19** schools, **80** teachers, **1,410** students participated in the competition statewide. Nine high school students advanced to the Poetry Out Loud state finals which were hosted at Mississippi Public Broadcasting in Jackson.
